#### Improving Library services and spaces with UX

User Experience (UX) is the study of target users to collect and analyse data about their interactions with and experience of a product, system or service. The goal is to make improvements. Groups of Library staff have several UX activities either recently completed or underway in our online and physical spaces including:

- UX testing of the usability of the Tāmiro interface. Areas for improvement were identified, and liaison with the Recollect technical team on the changes is underway.
- Auckland Library teams have employed UX techniques in the computer zone and level one facilities. They have also
  gathered insights into students' communication preferences while they are in the library building.
- At Manawatū, teams have been engaging with UX to identify ways to improve a quiet study space on level three, and to
  investigate how the level one Wāhi Rorohiko computer zone is used.
- The Wellington Library UX team is investigating how students use the collaborative spaces on Level A.
